Guest Speaker Programme

The speaker for May is Robin Drury of the Fauna Survey Group of the Field Naturalists Club. Her areas of interest are frogs, remote cameras and The activities. Of the Field Naturalists Club.

Did you know that Damper Creek valley was used a motorcross (motorcycle) track in the early 1900s. This track arose from the dispute between the motorcycle clubs and Waverley Riding School running events in what is now known as the Jordanville district. The Waverley Riding Club had stables on a site immediately south of the Jordanville railway station. The horses were often scared by the loud noises from the motorcyclists operating in the area bounded by High Street Rd, Warrigal Rd, Scotchmans Creek and Bayview Rd (now known as Huntingdale Rd).

Some motorcyclists began using the area to the north of High Street Rd, between

Huntingdale and Stephensons Rd taking in the Damper Creek Valley. Early aerial photographs of the district clearly show the series of loop tracks crossing the creek and linking High Street Rd and Boundary Rd (now known as Highbury Rd).

Unfortunately the west bank of Damper Creek, about the area of what is now Bengal Cres. was later to become the site of the local gun and trap-shooting club. This group used the natural valley of Damper Creek to constrain bullets and shot. The motorcyclists upset the gun club members by riding through the range paddock causing them to halt their shooting competitions (although it was alleged by some cyclists that they had found shot marks on their motorcycles and claimed that they had been fired upon). The situation came to a head when a policeman from Oakleigh was run over while trying to stop the motorcyclists on the shooting range. The motorcyclists abandoned the site in the late 1920s and gun club folded in the late 1930s.
