

#### Thank you again to our FoDC volunteers

FoDC has been busy planting. On Sunday 19 July 2015 a small group of FoDC volunteers enjoyed the crisp sunny morning air planting out approx. 1,400 tube stock in the newly prepared mulched spaces at the rear of the Park Road/Warren Court houses. Thanks to Mark and Danny from the Bushcrew, who pre-prepared the holes with augurs which made the job skip along at a great pace. The new plantings will provide screening from the built area, thereby enhancing the bushland walking track experience, as well as attracting birds and butterflies to the new and vast variety of indigenous plant stock. To give you some inspiration in your own gardens the species planted on this occasion included -

Myrtle Wattle, Common & Kneed Wallaby-grasses, Cut Leaf Daisy, Bulbine Lily, Common Correa, Thatch Saw-sedge, Hop Goodenia, Purple Coral-pea, Austral Indigo, Native Flax, Spiny-headed Mat-rush, Common Rice-flower, Common Flat-pea, Purple sheath Tussock Grass, Grass Trigger Plant, Kangaroo Grass, Tufted & Tall Bluebells, Silver Wattle, Lightwood, Blackwood, Silver-leaved Stringybark, Longleaved Box, Red Stringybark, Yellow Box, Messmate, Narrow-leaf Peppermint, Hop Wattle Prickly Moses, Sweet Bursaria, Shiny Cassinia, Prickly Currant-bush, Narrow-leaf Bitter pea, Hemp Bush, Bushy Needlewood, Tree Everlasting, Golden Spray, Tall & Knob Sedges.

# <u>Response to MCC Amendment C125: Proposed new residential zones.</u> <u>URGENT – HAVE YOUR SAY – closing date 31 August 2015</u>

If it is right for you, individual Monash residents are urged to respond to MCCouncil - HAVE YOUR SAY -to support the introduction of the proposed new planning zones.

FoDC are very encouraged by the new zonings to protect our creek environs. FoDC encourages <u>each individual resident</u> to write an email or letter to Monash Council if you are in support of the two new zones: *-NRZ2'Creek Abuttal' and NRZ3'Creek Environs*' which will give greater vegetation and landscape protection to bushland/creek environs in the City of Monash.

Residents who approve of the newly proposed zoning protections may not feel that they need to respond as they are in agreement, but it is vitally important that your messages are sent to Council to show balance to the final decision.

If it is right for you, a <u>very brief email or letter</u> is all that is required. Even a few words such as 'l *approve of the new zonings';* or 'Monash needs to protect its treed environment'; or '*thank you for proposing the new zonings to protect the creek environs in the City of Monash*" etc....



# Monash Gardens for Wildlife

The Monash City Council Sustainability Team has recently produced a new publication 'Gardens for Wildlife'. The booklet explains the importance of the natural environment and



biodiversity, details flora and fauna of the Monash region, and provides planting advice for indigenous vegetation.

The aim of this resource is to encourage residents to create indigenous gardens on their properties in an effort to increase biodiversity in Monash. Such gardens would provide greater habitat and 'stepping stories' for wildlife through this highly urbanized landscape.

Along with this booklet, Monash Council is planning to develop a *Gardens for Wildlife* program. Such a program may include household visits to help residents determine what weeds exist on their property, what indigenous species could replace them and advice on starting and/or further developing their own indigenous garden.

Household visits will be run by a volunteer site assessor who will be

trained in how to perform such a visit. Time commitment for volunteers is not likely to be more than approx. one hour for each visit, and they would only have to perform a visit if they are able to at that particular time and date. #### Bird of the Month - Pied Currawong

The Pied Currawong prefers a habitat of forests and woodlands, and has become well adapted to suburban areas. It feeds on a variety of foods including small lizards, insects, caterpillars and berries. In urban areas where suitable cover is scarce they may feed on small prey immediately. Prey may be stored in a 'larder (hung on a hook or in a tree fork or crevice) and either eaten straight away, or in the case of larger prey, such as young possums, over a period of time.

The Pied Currawong is a large, mostly black bird, with a bright yellow eye. Small patches of white are confined to the under tail, the tips and bases of the tail feathers and a small patch towards the tip of each wing (visible in flight). The bill is large and black and the legs are dark grey black. Both male and female are similar, although the female may sometimes be greyer on the underparts. Young Pied Currawongs are duller and browner than the adult.

And check out No. 12 on the Top 40 Chart for the Pied Currawong's song –It is categorized as a 'Caroller' along with the Australian Magpie and the Grey Butcherbird. Take time to listen to other bird songs listed on the 'Top 40 Chart' known as The Sorrows, The Screechers, The Hooters, The Whistlers, The Cacklers, The Criers, The Peepers, The Clocks, The Waverers, The Trillers, and The Cooers. Can you identify any of these songs from the birds in your backyard?
