Council Vote on "Proposed new planning provisions for tree and vegetation removal – Monash Urban Landscape and Canopy Vegetation Strategy (Vegetation Strategy)"

In Brief: Council approved that a permit must be sought for removal of a canopy tree of more than 6 metres high and more than 3 metres away from an existing dwelling (2 metres for Oakleigh ward). The revised protection applies to all types of dwellings across all of Monash, including single dwellings.

The following response was given by FoDCR to the Monash City Council, CEO, Strategic Planners and Councillors following the favourable vote at the Council meeting on 25 June 2019.

The Friends of Damper Creek Reserve Mt Waverley extend their thanks and appreciation that the above item was adopted as a stronger planning provision for protecting canopy trees and vegetation across Monash

We are particularly pleased to see the adoption of a Significant Landscape Overlay across the City of Monash that will require a planning permit for canopy tree and vegetation removal

We urge that the Interim SLO requiring a permit for canopy tree removal be implemented as soon as possible

June working Bee

Following the massive Community Planting Day working bee in May, the planting in June was a moregentle affair. A small but dedicated group started by planting a range of aquatic plants in the creek bed behind our Jubilee memorial in Park Road. We also planted extra plants to improve the area around our Jubilee memorial. The day finished by a special planting of three semi-mature gums in the grassy area near the site of the May planting. These gums were provided by the Council and financed by Melbourne Water as part of a special donation to help celebrate our Jubilee. Two Eucalyptus cephalocarpa (Silver leafed Stringybark) and one Eucalyptus melliodora (Yellow Box) were planted. These should mature to become wonderful canopy trees to replace the large Tassie Bluegum which blew down in a storm last year.

This was a very different planting event to our usual tube planting. The trees were in 12 inch pots and a suitably large hole was required. Luckily Daniel, the Bushcrew representative, was equipped with an augur which made quick work of the hole. The soil was suitably moist and the trees were provided with a watering collar and were later mulched. It will be interesting to compare the growth rate of these trees with those planted from tube stock.

Kookaburra and Grey Butcherbird Reflections

Last time I promised to tell you something of the eating habits of the kookaburra and grey butcherbird, and I will broaden that to tell of other things. Before even first light – when the magpie calls to welcome the dawn – the kooka has a first, short laugh. Towards noon, when all the other birds are resting, he sits besides his lady on a branch near his fishing pool and they enjoy a chorus. Last thing, when all the currawongs have called in evening [and what a splendid number we have this year], when all the bush is black, he has a final laugh at the world. I've never seen him eat more than a 15cm. lizard – or swoop down to the water for more than a yabby – but...

The grey butcherbird – who last season frequented the lake area at duck hatching time – is of a different colour. While he wears a morning suit: grey waistcoat, white shirt and tie and black tails. Perhaps the most remarkable thing about him, besides his glorious song, is his "human" feet. He has no reverse toe, as other birds have. I once saw him alight on a small bush (where the path turns down from Alice St.) and step inside, presumably for small bird prey, like a concert performer stepping behind the curtain. And when he opens his throat to sing he is like Caruso. Once I found him courting his lady from a chest high branch in a small tree above the fern gully. The glorious notes and the passion were equal to anything I'd heard in Grand Opera. I stood transfixed for some minutes. Then they flew off together down the fern gully pathway, he rotating around her, surrounding her with song, as they went.
