From the President's Desk



Signs of Spring

Given the current cold snap it seems hard to imagine that Spring is on its way. The Aussie bush continually amazes us with flowers at unexpected times and the early blooming of *Acacia dealbata*, or Silver Wattle heralds a bumper time for the Aussie bush. While the Silver Wattle is the first to bloom it marks the beginning of a sequence of flowering which is led by the wattles and is followed in turn by many other plants which comprise the complexity of the Australian bush. This year merits close examination of the plant life in Damper Creek as much of the work which has taken place over the past few years is now mature enough to flower.



Areas to watch over coming months.

With the increased Melbourne Water grant for this year there has been an explosion of new plants in the reserve. In addition, areas planted out in previous years are maturing and will put on a good show in the months to come.

1/ Meadow Garden: Located behind the Park Road houses and adjoining densely revegetated areas from previous years, there is a stunning array of small plants including everlasting daisies, running postman, chocolate lilies, guinea flowers, bluebells, bush peas and many more. Some will flower this year and others will take a few years to mature.

2/ Bush-crew compound environs: A great deal of planting has taken place in this area over the past few years. The chain of ponds is developing into a dense aquatic ecosystem but there is much more to see here.

3/ The island beds behind Warren Court: These areas have been cleared of weeds by volunteers from the “Friends” and have now been planted out with a range of small shrubs including myrtle wattle, hakea and native hemp.

4/ The pathway between the Alice Street bridge and the duck pond: Intensive planting with grasses, bluebells, dianellas, trigger plants and kidney weed has transformed this area, particularly on the uphill side of the path,

5/ Park Road nature strips and Jubilee area. The nature strips are proving to be a useful extension to the reserve and a showplace of smaller indigenous plants of Monash.



Member Survey



An Invasive Fungus!!!




Weeds and feral animals are problems we can come to grips with. Fungi (a separate “Kingdom” of life) are a bit harder to deal with. This fungus, photographed by Julia for last month’s newsletter, is actually a foreign invader with the potential to alter the local ecosystem.

The Orange Ping Pong Bats fungus or *Favolaschia claudopus* is a wood decomposing fungus that has been spreading rapidly in Australia since the 1990's. It is a threat indigenous fungi as it infests rotting timber and out competes native fungi that help in nutrient recycling. It is able to live in the canopy so airborne spores spread rapidly.

The fruiting body is small, about 1 to 2cm diameter with a distinctive honeycomb pattern underneath. If you see this try not to touch or remove it as this risks spreading the spores. Mark the spot and report it to the bush crew. For more information follow these links:

Gardens for wildlife

Several gardens adjacent to Damper Creek have been signed up to this program. Participation in Monash's Gardens for Wildlife program has the potential to reduce weed incursion into the reserve as well as enhance the environmental value of your own garden.

C169

C169 involves an increase in contributions to Council open space funding to be paid by developers involved in new subdivisions. The amendment involves a number of revisions to other Council strategies including the Monash Open Space Strategy. The Friends has made a submission to the council on this proposal. For more information type C169 in the search panel on the Council website.

Submissions are currently being reviewed, and it is expected Council will consider submissions at its August Meeting.

Dogs in Damper Creek

Notices have been posted around Monash regarding the revision of off-leash areas for dogs. Damper Creek Conservation Reserve has been listed for removal of its leash-free status. This is consistent with Damper creek reserve being listed as a conservation reserve but many are upset as the very existence of the reserve is due to its value as a dog walking area. The council consultation is open until September 30th so if you have an opinion regarding this issue we encourage you to submit your views to the council.
