In reading through the various reports from the early days, one realises that community concerns have not changed much. Fifty years ago there was controversy around loss of vegetation, lack of public open space, excessive development, water runoff, erosion, weeds, etc. etc.. What has changed is the conversion of a weed infested, eroded drain with development potential into a priceless haven for wildlife and a valued recreation area for the inhabitants of the City of Monash and beyond.

City of Monash Biodiversity Strategy:

We wish to remind members that the deadline to complete the Council's survey on the Biodiversity Strategy is this Wednesday 17 October. The simplest way to do this is to log on to the Monash website at *monash.vic.gov.au* and type "biodiversity" into the search panel. This will lead you straight to the draft strategy and the survey. This is a numbers game, the more responses received, the more impact it has on council's decisions. Written submissions may also be made to the council if you feel the survey is not sufficient to expresss your feelings on this subject.

Environmental Advisory Committee of the City of Monash

Our long-standing member, Meg Ralph has joined the Environmental Advisory Committee of the City of Monash as a community representative. The committee consists of three councillors, (Josh Fergeus, Brian Little and Lynette Saloumi) and 13 community members. Meg has attended two meetings at which the major issues presented were the draft Monash Urban Land Vegetation Strategy and the draft Urban Biodiversity Strategy, in both of which Damper Creek plays a pivotal role.

Some of the other issues covered to date were:

Purchase of a proportion of the energy for the Council from renewable sources via a power purchase agreement with the Eastern Alliance for Greenhouse action.

The emissions profiles of Monash as a corporate entity and of the municipality.

A new recycling station for batteries, phones, light globes, X-rays and CDs and videos set up in the Civic Centre foyer.

The Sustainability Hub at Mackie Road Neighbourhood House, located at Wellington Reserve Community Centre, showcasing solar, a community and indigenous garden and market and sustainability workshops.
