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What does Damper Creek Reserve mean to you?

During Melbourne's lockdown the activity within the reserve has been remarkable. The reserve has provided an escape for hundreds of locals, many of whom have discovered our little oasis for the first time. The benefits of the reserve are many, it provides a location for exercise, a place to connect with nature and, during the coming warmer months, it will provide a refuge several degrees cooler than the surrounding streets. The wildlife appreciate it too. Lizards, tortoises, possums and birds are frequent inhabitants and visitors to the reserve. While the influence of the reserve on birdlife is obvious, it is difficult to quantify. For the last six years Birdlife Australia has conducted the "Backyard Bird Count". You, too, can participate and become an important part of this citizen science project. You don't have to be an expert and Birdlife Australia provide all the resources you need. More details further on in this newsletter. With the changing nature of Mount Waverley, larger houses, smaller gardens and fewer trees, such monitoring is vital to document the effect our changing neighborhood has on our wildlife. It is sobering to consider that fifty-two years ago a small group of passionate locals fought against authorities who planned to barrel drain



the creek and subdivide the land. When you look at what we have today, such a development proposal would seem incomprehensible. How many of today's development proposals will deprive future generations of a similar oasis in suburbia? The transformation from an unloved wasteland does not happen without effort and vision. The landscaping of the creek bed, elimination of weeds and a continual program of replanting are the result of a long partnership between the council, Melbourne Water and the passionate membership of the "Friends". Long may it continue.

Backyard Bird Count

Bird Life Australia are running their annual Backyard Bird Count from October 19th to 25th. This is a real opportunity to become involved in a citizen science project. It does not require an extensive knowledge of Australian birds, just a commitment to register and spend any number of 20 minute blocks of time during the week of the survey to record the birds seen (including invasive species).

You can choose your own backyard or any outdoor space including Damper Creek.

There are many resources available through the Birdlife Australia website. However, for the beginner birdwatcher I came across a publication "Melbirds" which, though written for children, provides an easy to use guide for the most common birds found in Melbourne. There are 63 species included, each illustrated with an excellent photo. The guide can be downloaded as a pdf from the Melbirds website.
